


Between grain, dune, salt, and sky explores the dominant and understated narratives of desert geographies, displacement, architecture, archives, skin, sound, and subversive technologies of image-making across landscapes from the Mediterranean, the Gulf, the Red Sea, and the Atlantic Ocean. Inspired, in part, by the ongoing research of Sudanese-Canadian writer Nehal El-Hadi, the exhibition explores sand as both a material and a metaphor, offering a framework through which to consider the entanglements of Black life, migration, and extractive economies.

The works of Rolla Tahir, Dawit L. Petros, and Wintana Hagos engage with borderlands, desert crossings, and nearby coastal crossings, mediating on forced movement, (un)belonging, and embodied memory amid strife and geopolitical conditions. The metaphor of sand extends beyond regional specificity to its uses in infrastructure developments during colonial and postindependence periods, underscoring the enduring imperial foreign dependency that characterizes most African countries today. Shifting from sand to soil, Mallory Lowe Mpoka's use of clay photo-objects both addresses the colonial legacies of photography while simultaneously subverting the dominant and colonial gaze of early photographic processes. And lastly, drawing upon the Black feminist lineage of writers like Toni Cade Bambara, salt emerges as a potent metaphor to imagine the healing and preservation properties of the material in the natural world and the human body. Jessica Karuhanga's work in imaging the Black body thoughtfully engages with representational politics, navigating a space between intimacy and opacity.

Through their visual strategies and material engagements with elements that explicitly or subtly gesture to sand, soil, and salt, these themes emerge as alternative grammars for articulating Black life beyond the limitations of traditional archives and image-making conventions.
